ONLY TWO DAYS LEFT TO SAVE LAST LOCAL HERD OF NATIVE BIGHORNS!

Just over Vail Pass in Eagle County, <u>ESWA</u>, the Town of Vail, and a <u>group of concerned citizens</u> are trying to preserve the last remaining winter habitat for a native herd of Rocky Mountain bighorn sheep. The S2 Gore Range Bighorn herd has over-wintered on the land, locally known as Booth Heights, for millennia. But now the last of their winter habitat is threatened by development. The Town of Vail must decide at their October 3 meeting whether to pay the \$17.5 million condemnation price, plus associated costs and fees in the \$3 million range. Eagle County may contribute, but both the County and Town say they need to receive confirmation of widespread public support for the purchase.

HELP SET NEXT YEAR'S PRIORITIES FOR WILDERNESS WORK

Every year ESWA works with the Forest Service to determine what projects we will work on next year. We certainly don't want to put unnecessary improvements in our Wilderness Areas, which after all are supposed to be *untrammeled*! On the other hand, carefully planned projects can both preserve the wilderness and make visits safer and even more pleasant. When we improve trails and bridges and cut back vegetation on the trails, we help keep hikers on the trail, protecting the vegetation and preventing erosion. We also restore illegal campfire rings near lakes, hopefully discouraging more fires, which are highly damaging to our fragile alpine environment.

Next year, in addition to our yearly Volunteer Wilderness Ranger hikes, Trailhead Hosting, and Sawyer tree-clearing programs, ESWA is looking at numerous projects. These include restoring the old Surprise Lake trail, helping with the Buffalo-Willow Creek reroute, and (if hoped-for grants are provided) rebuilding Summit County's Meadow Creek Trail. And, thanks to a generous grant from Maryann Gaug, we will replace the South Willow Creek bridge. And of course, we will continue our Deluge Lake maintenance and trek with llamas on our four (perhaps even five) weekend trips to work deeper in the wilderness.

What repairs, maintenance, or restoration do you think need to be done? Are there ignored areas that need some TLC? Where should we take our weekend llama trips? ESWA is considering a multi-year program "Wilderness Gateways" to restore and repair the overused trails to the wilderness along I-70. Which trails would you nominate? Can you join us and help organize projects – Let us know!
