IMPORTANT NEWS FOR ALL VOLUNTEER WILDERNESS RANGERS



Our season is almost upon us! Here's some important information for current VWRs:

- VWR Recert: VWRs need annual recertification. A 30-minute mandatory refresher session will be held by Zoom on Monday, May 15, and again on Tuesday, May 23, both from 7:00 pm-7:30 pm. You can attend either. The Zoom link will be sent out in early May. One of the sessions will be recorded for later viewing by those who can't attend either Zoom session. Topics will include relevant new USFS regs, a quick review of the Authority of the Resource technique, the new signup and reporting forms, and a few recent accounts of approaches that have worked best (and worst).
- JHA and Release forms: You will shortly be receiving an email from Zach Kauk with this year's USFS Job Hazard Analysis and ESWA's Release and Uniform Policy. These must be signed before you can do any patrols or other volunteer work for ESWA this summer.
- New VWR Training: This year's training for new VWRs is Saturday June 3 at the Eagles Nest HOA Pavilion. **YOU** are our best recruiter! Please reach out to friends and neighbors and encourage them to become VWRs. The link to the application form is on our website.
- Mentors: Mentors are a critical part of training and retaining new VWRs. If you are willing to be a Mentor,

- THH: Consider performing one or more trailhead hosting sessions this summer. They are fun and rewarding, count as one of your four minimum patrols, and allow you to contact more people. Consider tag-teaming with another VWR one patrols for two hours while the other stays at the trailhead, and then switch. Enjoy the best of both worlds!
- Party! We will be having kick-off parties for ESWA volunteers in early June in both Eagle County and Summit County. ESWA will buy your first beer! Dates and locations will be announced soon.

LLAMA-SUPPORTED BACKPACKING TRIPS – JOIN ESWA AND THE USFS

Llamas are great fun to hike with and allow us to camp at gorgeous backcountry lakes (while lightening our loads). We generally hike in on a Friday afternoon, work hard on Saturday taking out illegal fire pits, clearing trash, and improving trails, and then hike out on Sunday. This year's destinations are:

- July 7-9: Eagles Nest Wilderness: Soda Lakes (north of Piney Lake)
- July 21-23: Eagles Nest Wilderness: Wheeler Lakes and Lost Lake (Copper Mtn Exit)
- August 4-6: Eagles Nest Wilderness: Gore Lake
- August 18-20: Eagles Nest Wilderness: Willow Lakes (above Silverthorne)
- August 24-27 (3 nights!): Flat Tops Wilderness

Although ESWA's season for patrols, sawyering, and trailhead hosting is just warming up, ESWA members have been actively promoting ESWA's mission to preserve Wilderness and inform the public about our Wilderness Areas – here are just a few examples!

• ESWA Chair Karn Stiegelmeier participated in the April 30 Earth Day Forum *The Need to Grow* held at Colorado Mountain College in Breckenridge. Karn hosted an ESWA table and encouraged people to volunteer and support ESWA's efforts to help the Forest Service preserve and protect Wilderness Areas.

- Bill Betz spoke on April 11 in Fort Collins about the history of the Wilderness movement, and efforts by ESWA and four cognate organizations in northern Colorado helping the Forest Service protect these precious public lands. The 10th in a series of talks Bill has given, the second part of the talk highlights ESWA and the other four all-volunteer groups (PWV, IPWA, FOMELC and FOW) and their different Wilderness Areas. This talk was different in that the audience was PWV (Poudre Wilderness Volunteers) that covers Cache La Poudre, Comanche Peak, Neota and Rawah Wilderness Areas. The many knowledgeable people in the audience included Dave Cantrell of National Wilderness Stewardship Alliance. PWV plans to publicize Bill's recorded talk on their website and social media. Bill's host, Jeff Randa, and Dave Cantrell talked about a possible workshop for the five organizations later this year. Mike Browning, Eric Malmborg, Bo Chapin, and Joan Betz also attended. - Former ESWA Chair Mike Browning will attend the training weekend put on by PWV, to compare their extensive 3-day events, with lots of scenarios, to gain ideas for improving our VWR training efforts.
- Mike Browning serves on the Eagle County Community Wildlife Roundtable's Education and Public Outreach Committee, which meets monthly to promote wildlife awareness and protection of critical habitat in Eagle County. Mike also recently met with the USFS, Town of Vail, and Wilderness Workshop representatives to discuss the Booth Falls Mitigation Project, which will reduce fuel loading and enhance Bighorn Sheep habitat in the Vail Valley north of I-70.
