UPDATE: SAVE THE VAIL BIGHORN HERD – MORE ACTION NEEDED!

Thanks to everyone who responded to our letter-writing campaign to encourage the Town of Vail Council to preserve critical bighorn sheep habitat above east Vail. In response to the outpouring of support, council members voted to approve a motion directing the Town Attorney to prepare a resolution of intent to condemn the property.

But we are not there yet! The vote was a close 4-3 with council members Foley, Langmaid, Mason, and Stauffer voting in favor and council members Coggin, Davis, and Seibert voting against.

We need you to:

- **Email council members** by tomorrow May 2 at publicinput.vailtowncouncil@vailgov.com and (1) thank them for beginning the process of condemning the parcel, and (2) encourage them to vote YES on the May 3 resolution to condemn the Booth Heights property and protect it as permanent wildlife habitat.
- **Consider attending** (in person or virtually) the 6pm Tuesday, May 3 Council meeting as council members consider the resolution of intent as an action item. This meeting will take place in the Vail Town Council Chambers, 75 S. Frontage Road. Public comment will be accepted in person or virtually by registering at vailgov.com/town-council.

EVER WONDER HOW TREES ARE CLEARED FROM EAGLE AND SUMMIT US FOREST TRAILS?

Because of the devastation the [mountain pine beetle](#) caused from the 1990s to 2012, the Rocky Mountains are filled with stands of dead trees. As the roots of these trees die, the effects of snow and wind cause them to fall across our many trails in the Wilderness.

The US Forest Service clears many of these trails, but simply doesn't have the capability to clear everything. That's where groups like ESWA step in. ESWA has partnered with the Forest Service to clear trees from specific trails in Eagle and Summit counties – and all that work is done by volunteers using [vintage two-man crosscut saws](#) and other handsaws.

We'd love to have you join our team. There are two ways to volunteer. The first is to join our mailing list and volunteer with one of our certified Sawyers to clear a trail this summer. We'll email you when a clearing event is scheduled, and you can join when it is convenient for you.

The second way to volunteer is to become a certified Sawyer and help lead teams who clear trails. This requires first-aid certification, and completion of a free 8-hour online course, short evening session, and 2-day field certification program led by the Forest Service. Our 2022 training program is June 10-12.

NATIVE PLANT LOVERS (WEED HATERS!)



ESWA continues to fight invasive weed populations. Thanks to the dedicated work of Jim Alexander, ESWA received a grant from the [National Forest Foundation Ski Conservation Fund](#) to treat several noxious weed infestations professionally - for the fourth summer in a row! We also will be conducting several weed pulls - July 9 and 12 in Summit County in conjunction with FDRD, and in Eagle County (dates to be determined). On the native plant side, we hope to schedule seed gathering days in August or September. Seeds are used to preserve and replant native species. 
